Key achievements to date:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
One of the strengths of Bredon Hill Academy is sport, not just in Key Stage 2 but across the whole age range. Pupils are offered a wide variety of sporting activities in lessons and out of lesson clubs that are open to all. The school are regular attendees at School Games events and also took part in the Spring and Summer School Games. We also proudly host events and tournaments.	Continue to seek to improve engagement and sporting experiences of disadvantaged pupils and students with SEN, as identified by pupil take-up.
A range of sporting opportunities are offered within school and beyond, including clubs, intrahouse competition, friendlies with neighbouring schools, district, regional, county and national competitions and visits to sporting events.	, , ,
Four hours per fortnight of PE provision has continued during timetabled lessons across the academic year. Pupils have also had opportunities for physical activity during break and lunchtimes, making use of the extensive field space in the summer term, with additional resources provided and engagement supported by PE staff and SLT supervision. Pupils who were not on track over the year were suitably supported through adaptive teaching strategies.	Please note that as we are a middle school, the funding only applies to students in year 6. The majority of KS2 is completed by feeder first schools, who offer swimming provision where available.
Pupil engagement is tracked and we aim to explore opportunities to prioritise and support pupils who perhaps wouldn't always receive access to sports provision outside of school to get involved or take part.
